(Acts 9:3-9; 26:15-18; Philippians 3:12)
3. God has **called** you and has designed a role for you in **building** His Church.  
(Acts 9:10-16; 17-19; Ephesians 1:4-5; 2:8-10)
4. God's first concern is what He's doing **in** you rather than **through** you.  
(Acts 9:20-31; Colossians 1:10-14; I John 4:4)

(Questions and Scriptures for further study)

1. Review what you know about Saul. (Acts 7:58-8:3) What picture does Luke paint in Acts 9:1-2?
2. What was Saul's encounter with Jesus Christ like in Acts 9:3-9? What is the emotional, spiritual, physical and social climate?
3. Whose conversion to Christianity has been most astonishing to you? Why? How does your conversion compare and contrast with that of Saul's? What does Saul's conversion tell us about those in our lives who are most unlikely to believe?

4. Ananias is the second person within three days to have a direct encounter with God. Compare and contrast his encounter (Acts 9:10-16) with that of Saul.

5. Saul says, "Who are you, Lord" and Ananias says "Here I am, Lord". How do you typically respond to God's voice? What have you heard God calling you to do lately? At THRIVE? Church? Community Group? Personally at work or school?

6. How might your obedience to God's call bring about salvation to those around you? How might your disobedience turn people away from God and salvation? What role does discipleship (The Journey) play into our obedience?
